Thoughts on the Stoke-on-Trent Civic Prayer Breakfasts 2017 and 2024

On Friday 10th May, I went with Sheila Skelding to the Stoke on Trent Civic Prayer Breakfast at the King's Hall, Stoke. All sectors of Christian life were represented with a heavy emphasis on Christian congregations, of which there are currently 123 stretching from Tunstall in the north to Fenton and Longton in the south.

There were many familiar faces. Several Swan Bank stalwarts were much in evidence, including both ministers, and the Community shop team. Lloyd Cooke, along with Pastor Norah Chilaka directed the programme of events. In the orchestra Megan played the violin. So, Swan Bank was well represented, as was its place in the network of Potteries' churches.

It certainly brought back memories. Sheila and I last attended the Civic prayer breakfast in 2017. In 2018 I had cancer and was out of action for months. By the time my scans were clear, covid and lockdown had emptied all calendars. I will never forget the help given in prayers, practical assistance, and hospital visits by members of our congregation. Attending the Civic Prayer Breakfast was picking up the threads after seven years. Some of the other participants must have felt the same way.

The basic format had hardly changed with a 07:30am start! By coincidence the joint authors of one of Sheila's religious books, 'The Tide is Turning', sat at our table. A procession of notable places in the region filled the video screen, providing a lead-in to the presentations of the speakers. From Spode to the Etruria marina all stages of the Potteries evolution were portrayed. As in 2017, MP's, councillors, business leaders and academics contributed their support. Due to the greater number of guests, this year's breakfast was self-service, whereas in 2017 our meal was silver service. Though, let it be made clear, the food was just as good!

The change in circumstances was driven home in the opening speech by the Leader of the Council, Jane Ashworth. She turned the spotlight on poverty and the effect of the cuts. Her forecast 'Every day would be a budget day' had proved depressingly correct. The struggle to cope with massive social problems was a hard one with no let up. For example, 1,200 children were in care, more than anywhere else in the country. The cuts hit the early intervention measures that would prevent the ill effects of childhood deprivation from ruining adult lives.

A video followed. 'The Church in the City' showed how the churches were weaving themselves into the community. The shrinkage of central and local government support had left gaps which the churches and voluntary organisations were trying to fill. In Biblical times synagogues were mini-welfare states. The bestowal of alms was a duty. When Jesus healed a blind man, the blind man's parents declined to admit that a miracle had taken place as they feared being put out of the synagogue. In those times such an expulsion would have amounted to a death sentence.

Even in 2017 the scale and variety of church interaction with the community had been considerable. Now in response to events, food banks and community groceries have been springing up to meet increasing need. Loneliness has been addressed. I treasure the words of Eileen Leese, a recently deceased member of Swan Bank. She said that she always tried to remember Jesus' command, 'Whatever you do for someone else, you do it for me.' The churches have certainly taken this instruction to heart. Swan Bank was represented on the video also. Vera Woodcock appeared at a gathering. Fame at last for one of our veterans!

Jan MacFarlane, Assistant Bishop of Lichfield, gave the keynote speech. She had been born, bred, and educated in the area so was well-informed and spoke our language well. Her comments on our way of life were warm and witty. I was reminded of the speech given by Martin Tideswell, then the editor of 'the Sentinel', at the 2017 breakfast. 'If you love Stoke-on-Trent, it will love you back'.

A lot has changed in seven years. Buildings have gone down and buildings have gone up. Takeaways have proliferated, but underneath it is still the city of Wedgewood and Wesley. It has an inner coherence, a basic sense of community stronger than that in Manchester or any other conurbation.

The breakfast ended with the hymn 'Love Divine, All Loves Excelling', which Sam Taylor used as the main hymn the following Sunday morning at Swan Bank. We socialised, introducing ourselves to strangers. Among others I met a nice young lady from Fenton church. If it were not for events like this one, our circles of Christian friends would not expand or overlap.

Next year the Civic Prayer Breakfast will be held on the 5th June. Be sure to book early as this year's attendance was the highest ever and next year's might be even higher!

Focus on Re-launch of Sunday Night Young Adults

From 7:30pm on Sunday evenings, young adults are welcome to meet at SwanBank for discussion groups, teaching, and socials after the evening service. We encourage young people from other churches and other denominations from across the city to join us.

Many of us have spent our childhood in and around children's work. As we moved on from vouth work, we still wanted to meet and socialise in church with other young people. Excited by this idea we decided to launch a young adult's session that follows from the evening service, it's called Sunday Night Young Adults (SNYA). The sessions stand in addition to the other work offered such as the 18-30's home groups.

Since we started planning in the Summer of 2022, we have had the pleasure of helping to run six evening service events at SwanBank where the SNYA have led the worship, hosted and brought The Word. The most recent was May 12th when two of our members shared their faith story and what it means to follow Jesus. We have welcomed in guests who have lead sessions on youth and evangelism, worship ministry and best life practices.

It is our aim help to encourage one another to ask the deeper faith and life questions in our discussions, in order to equip ourselves with answers for questions raised by living a life in faith and service. In our socials we have met for movie nights, sports, bowling, and we love to share food together.

The next time we will be hosting and leading the evening service at SwanBank will be advertised and we'd love to encourage you all to come along and if you are a young adult we'd love to invite you to join us at SNYA.
